
Vibrant. Wild. Alive. This is GALAPAGOS - one of the last great frontiers.

Each dive unfolds in electric blue: vast schools of scalloped hammerheads, cruising Galápagos and silky sharks, passing whale sharks, and playful sea lions weaving through the currents.

Their extreme isolation has kept these sites wild and uncompromising. Strict protections and careful management preserve the raw power of this ecosystem, where nature still dictates the rules. For divers drawn to adrenaline, scale, and truly iconic encounters, Darwin and Wolf represent the pinnacle of Galápagos diving.

WHY BOOK THIS EXPERIENCE?

When Brooke Pyke first travelled to the Galápagos in 2024 aboard the Galápagos Sky, she was already an experienced underwater photographer and dive instructor. The diversity of marine species and life below and above astounded her. At Darwin and Wolf Islands, life moves with purpose and harmony, the underwater scenes were filled with marine life on a remarkable scale: sweeping walls of hammerhead sharks, gigantic 15m whale sharks passing by, and a density of fish so thick it was hard to see ahead at times.

The Galápagos rewards patience and presence. Rather than rushing from one sighting to the next, Brooke discovered that the most meaningful moments came from settling in, observing behaviour, and allowing the ocean to reveal itself naturally. When you slow down, the experience becomes surprisingly calm — a feeling of being part of something much larger.

Inspired by this, Brooke designed Galápagos expeditions for divers who want a supportive, well-paced experience without pressure or rush. Based on her own time aboard the Galápagos Sky, these small-group liveaboard journeys focus on comfort and experiencing the wild close up. Joining Brooke to co-host this expedition will be her close friend Nush Freedman who is an exceptional cinematographer skilled in visual story telling. Both Brooke and Nush will be your guides hosts during the experience, sharing their photo and cinematography knowledge throughout the trip.

The Galápagos Sky provides an ideal setting for experiencing the wilds of Galapagos. With an experienced crew, smooth daily routines, and access to the archipelago's most iconic sites, the liveaboard allows divers to feel grounded and cared for throughout the journey. Everything is designed so you can relax, enjoy the process, and simply be present underwater.

Beyond encountering iconic species, Brooke and Nush encourages divers to move slowly, refine buoyancy, and interact with wildlife in a calm, respectful way. For underwater photographers, this creates space to focus on composition and storytelling, supported by Brooke's guidance in a relaxed and encouraging environment. Joining Brooke will be her close friend Nush who is an exceptional cinematographer skilled in visual story telling.

By approaching the Galápagos with intention and ease, these journeys offer more than extraordinary dives. They provide a sense of connection — to the ocean, to the wild, and to your place amongst it all. Making the 8 day journey an experience that is unforgettable.

ABOUT THE GALAPAGOS

The Galápagos Islands are a remote volcanic archipelago located nearly 1,000 kilometres off the coast of Ecuador in the eastern Pacific Ocean. Formed by volcanic activity over millions of years, the islands are geologically young and constantly evolving, shaped by eruptions, lava flows, and the powerful ocean currents that surround them. First recorded by Europeans in 1535, the Galápagos remained largely isolated for centuries, allowing life to develop in extraordinary and unusual ways. This isolation famously inspired Charles Darwin during his visit aboard the HMS Beagle in 1835, contributing to his theory of evolution by natural selection. Today, the islands are recognised as one of the most important natural laboratories on Earth and are protected as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Strict conservation measures limit human impact and help preserve the fragile balance between wildlife and habitat.

On land, the Galápagos are home to an array of endemic species found nowhere else on the planet. Giant tortoises roam arid highlands and lush volcanic slopes, while marine iguanas — the only sea-going lizards in the world — bask on black lava rocks between foraging dives. Blue-footed boobies, flightless cormorants, Darwin's finches, and lava lizards exemplify the unique adaptations that evolved in the absence of natural predators.

Beneath the surface, the Galápagos are equally remarkable. Where warm tropical waters meet cold, nutrient-rich currents from the deep ocean, an exceptionally productive marine ecosystem thrives. These waters support schooling hammerhead sharks, Galápagos sharks, whale sharks, manta rays, sea turtles, and vast schools of fish. This convergence of currents creates a rare overlap of tropical and temperate species, resulting in one of the most diverse and dynamic marine environments in the world. Today, the Galápagos Marine Reserve is one of the largest protected marine areas on the planet, safeguarding critical habitats for migratory species and supporting ongoing scientific research. While climate change and increasing pressures remain challenges, the Galápagos stand as a powerful example of conservation in action — a place where geology, wildlife, and history intertwine to tell the story of evolution, resilience, and the enduring connection between land and sea.

Brooke Pyke is a nature, ocean and wildlife photographer, expedition leader and conservation storyteller based on Western Australia's Ningaloo Reef. With a background as a PADI dive instructor and years spent working in remote marine environments, she has built a career documenting some of the most biodiverse and visually striking ecosystems on the planet, both above and below the surface.

Specialising in underwater, wildlife, aerial and editorial photography, Brooke's work centres on marine megafauna, fragile ecosystems and the human relationship with wild places. Her imagery has been published internationally in outlets including Australian Geographic, Oceanographic Magazine and Alert Diver, and is regularly contributed to conservation initiatives, scientific research and species identification catalogues for manta rays and whale sharks. Her photographs have also been recognised through numerous international awards, reflecting a strong commitment to visual storytelling rooted in authenticity, fieldcraft and environmental responsibility.

Beyond photography, Brooke leads small-group, nature-based expeditions in remote locations, guiding participants in ethical wildlife encounters while teaching photography in real-world field conditions. Drawing on her experience as a dive professional, researcher and creative, she brings a practical, safety-focused and deeply informed approach to working in dynamic ocean and wilderness environments.

At the heart of Brooke's work is a desire to foster connection — using photography, writing and shared experience to inspire appreciation, understanding and long-term protection of the natural world.

EXPEDITION ITINERARY

OCEAN WONDERS 7-NIGHT ITINERARY

A thrilling weeklong journey through the heart of the Galapagos' most iconic dive sites. With 3 full days dedicated to exploring the legendary Wolf and Darwin Islands, divers can expect unparalleled encounters with hammerhead sharks, whale sharks, manta rays, and other vibrant marine life.

Departing and returning to San Cristobal (SCY), this itinerary blends exciting underwater experiences with the comfort and luxury of Galapagos Sky.

Day 0 - Arrival San Christobel Island Saturday

Meet up with your expedition leaders and fellow guests in San Christobel for a 1 night pre trip stay near the harbour. Rest and recuperate after your journey. Explore the charming local town and meet the wildlife living along the shores and harbour. Join with everyone for a welcome dinner at a local restaurant in San Christobel.

Day 1 - Departure Onboard Galapagos Sky Sunday

Divers arriving on the day of departure, you will be greeted at your hotel and escorted to the Galapagos Sky by the crew. Upon boarding, dive bags will be delivered to the dive deck, and personal luggage will be taken to your cabins. You will receive a welcome briefing that includes an overview of the onboard facilities, Galapagos National Park regulations, and a personal interview with the dive masters. Following this, we will conduct a mandatory safety drill. After lunch, we will set sail for Isla Lobos for your check-out dive.

Day 2 - land visit + 2 dives Monday

Start your day with a full breakfast, followed by a land visit to North Seymour. After lunch, enjoy some relaxation time and dive briefings before heading out for Dive 2 and Dive 3 at Cousins Rock.
AM North Seymour / PM Cousins Rock
North Seymour Island, renowned for its iconic blue-footed boobies and magnificent frigate birds. Visitors frequently witness the blue-footed booby's elaborate courtship dance, where males showcase their bright blue feet to attract mates. The island is also a prime spot for observing the magnificent frigate bird's striking red throat pouch during courtship displays. Additionally, you'll encounter vibrant land iguanas and playful sea lions, making it a truly memorable wildlife experience.
Cousins Rocks is a top dive site featuring a stunning wall, black corals, and abundant marine life. Expect to see frogfish, seahorses, scorpionfish, octopuses, and large schools of barracuda. Sea lions often accompany divers during safety stops. The site offers minimal current.

Day 3, 4, 5

Tuesday-Thursday

- Tues. - 4 Dives a day at Wolf including 1 night dive
- Wed. - 4 dives at Darwin
- Thurs. - 3 Dives total, 2 at Darwin and 1 afternoon dive at Wolf

Wolf and Darwin Islands are renowned as some of the best dive sites in the world.

Darwin Island, particularly The Pillars (former Arch), offers unparalleled diving with schooling hammerhead sharks, Galapagos sharks, and large pods of dolphins. From June to November, whale sharks are frequently spotted. The site also features thick schools of skipjack and yellowfin tuna, bigeye jacks, mobula rays, and occasional tiger sharks, marlin, and killer whales. Warm water temperatures and a variety of tropical fish enhance the experience.

Wolf Island, another top dive location, is known for its abundant shark sightings, including schooling hammerheads and aggregations of Galapagos sharks. Whale sharks are occasionally seen, along with dolphins, large schools of tuna, spotted eagle rays, and sea turtles. These waters attract Indo-Pacific species, and night dives reveal unique creatures like the Red Lipped batfish. The steep, vertical cliffs of these islands mean no shore excursions are possible, reinforcing their exclusivity and remote allure.

Day 6 - Fernandina and Isabela 3 Dives

Friday

AM Fernandina Island / PM Isabela Island

Cape Douglas on Fernandina Island offers a unique and thrilling diving experience, renowned for its remarkable marine iguana encounters. This dive site features a rugged underwater landscape with volcanic formations and a rich marine ecosystem.

Punta Vicente Roca on Isabela Island, our coldest yet rapidly growing favorite dive site features a steep, deep vertical wall adorned with soft corals, sponges, and endemic black corals. Divers will find a fascinating array of macro invertebrates, including Spanish lobster, shrimp, and nudibranchs, as well as bullhead sharks and red-lipped batfish. Mola Mola (oceanic sunfish) are the primary megafauna sightings. The wall also boasts a vibrant display of anemones and other macro invertebrates.

After your dive, the panga ride offers excellent photo opportunities with penguins, flightless cormorants, marine iguanas, sea lions and blue footed boobies.



Day 7 - 1 dive + land visit Saturday

AM Pinzon Island / PM Santa Cruz Island

Start your day with a full breakfast, followed by a dive at Pinzon Island. After lunch and relaxation, you'll take a land visit to the Highlands of Santa Cruz, where you'll encounter Giant Tortoises. Enjoy some free time in town before heading back to the Galapagos Sky.

Divers can expect to see various shark species, sea lions, mantas, and eagle rays at Pinzon. The site is also home to moray eels and a vibrant mix of tropical fish, including yellow-tailed surgeonfish, king angelfish, Moorish idols, steel pompano, snappers, grunts, creole fish, and barracuda

Day 8 - Return San Cristobal Island Sunday

Disembarkation Day

Disembarkation is at 8:30 a.m. You'll have the option to visit the Interpretation Center and then go to UMAMI, a local restaurant where you'll be offered a snack and a comfortable space to wait before heading to the airport.

Our yacht was built with divers needs in mind to offer year-round world-class diving in the Galapagos Islands. We have been offering dive liveaboard trips in the Galapagos since 2001, and our captain and crew are some of the most experienced in the region with over 40,000 dives combined and counting. 70% of our crew members are certified at least at the Open Water Level or beyond.

Onboard, 16 passengers are catered to an eight private en-suite guest cabins, fully air-conditioned and offers ample space for rest and relaxation. The main salon features an audio/video entertainment center and a separate dining area where Ecuadorian and international cuisine is served. Dining service is fine plated, and beverages, including beer and wine full bar, are included. The top deck is home to loungers for relaxing in between dives or star-gazing.





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Can you guarantee what we will see on the trip?

With nature there are no guarantees, and that's part of the adventure! Every expedition is unique, and nature decides what unfolds beneath the surface. Our experienced team will do everything possible to create incredible encounters and showcase the best of The Galapagos.

Whats the water temp?

From June to November, characterised by cooler water temperatures and stronger currents, attracting large pelagic sharks to the area—an unforgettable experience for any shark diving enthusiast in the Galapagos. The water temperature is around 60-75°F, 15-24°C.

Can I join if I'm not a photographer?

Absolutely. This trip is for anyone who wants to experience the magic of Galapagos. Photography is optional, many guests simply come for the world-class diving and connection to the ocean.

Can we bring a drone?

The use of drones is strictly prohibited in the Galapagos Islands without a permit from the Galapagos National Park. Please note that if a guest brings a drone on board Galapagos Sky without a proper permit, they will not be allowed to use it. We are unable to assist with obtaining drone permits.

What if we encounter bad weather?

Rough seas can be expected some days, Galapagos Sky is built for offshore conditions. Our experienced captain will adjust the route to ensure safety and comfort should it be necessary. Protected anchorages available if needed.

Do I need travel and diving insurance?

Yes. Comprehensive travel and dive insurance is essential. Make sure your policy covers scuba diving, as well as medical emergencies, cancellations, or other unforeseen events.

I'm not an experienced diver, can I join?

Diving in the Galapagos offers an exhilarating experience but requires advanced skills due to strong currents, variable visibility, and cooler water temperatures. We recommend divers have between 50 and 100 open water dives, experience with strong currents, the ability to remove gear in the water, and the skill to board small boats in choppy seas. Nitrox certification prior to the cruise is highly recommended. Proof of recent diving within past 6 months is mandatory.

Do I need my own diving gear?

It is highly recommended that divers bring their own gear. Advanced diving conditions that are common in Galapagos truly call for divers to be in their own, known and proper fitting gear. If a diver must rent gear, please understand that sizes, selection and quantities are extremely limited. Guests should note items to be rented and specific size(s) on the Application.

What certification is needed?

We recommend a minimum of Open Water Diver certification with a Deep Diver specialty or Advanced Open Water certification (30 m / 100 ft). Minimum 50+ logged dives and experience diving in open ocean and currents is recommended.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What camera should I bring?

That depends on your budget and goals. At a minimum, a GoPro is a great option for capturing wide-angle reef scenes and easy videos. For those with a bigger budget, a compact or full-frame camera with manual controls, a wide-angle or fisheye lens, and underwater housing will produce the best results.

Can you recommend a beginner camera setup?

Great beginner setups include the Canon G7X, Canon G16, Sony RX100, or Sony A6500, paired with a wide-angle or fisheye lens. Look for housing, domes, or wet lenses from brands like Nauticam, Aquatica, Ikelite, Marelux, or Fantasea.

Should I use floats for my camera?

We recommend a neutrally or very slightly negatively buoyant setup, as floating cameras can be difficult to manoeuvre underwater. Proper weighting can help you handle your camera more comfortably.

Do I need strobes or lights?

Strobes or video lights is recommended for photography on this trip as some sites are deep with less light. You can however get away without lights on shallower dives.

I'm a beginner at photography. Can I still join?

Absolutely! This trip is designed for photographers of all skill levels. We recommend practicing with your camera setup beforehand so you're familiar with its controls. If you have never dived with a camera before, we recommend getting some practice before the trip.

What is the average water visibility?

Visibility varies based on swell, wind, and tides, typically ranging from 5-30m.

Do I need to wear a wetsuit?

The water around Galapagos can be cool (15-25C), we recommend wearing a 7mm wetsuit and hood and gloves and warm dive booties.

I have a health condition, can I join?

It depends on your health condition, and even then, a doctor's letter of approval may be requested. You must disclose any medical conditions to us before the trip.

How much should I tip?

While gratuities are never mandatory, they are customary and always appreciated aboard. As a guideline, we recommend a tip of around 10% of the total trip cost. Tips are typically given in cash and may be offered in USD.
